

Benedictine College Fact Sheet 2010

Benedictine College's mission is the education of men and women within a community of faith and scholarship. We are a Catholic, Benedictine, liberal arts, and residential college. Benedictine College traces its roots to 1858, when three Benedictine monks came to Atchison, Kansas to found a monastery and a school, St. Benedict's College. In 1863, the monks were followed by seven Benedictine sisters who founded Mount St. Scholastica Monastery and began a companion school for women, St. Scholastica, in 1924. The two schools merged in 1971, creating a coeducational institution, which remains focused on the original mission of a Benedictine, Catholic, residential, and liberal arts institution.

Benedictine College students come from across 40 states, Puerto Rico; and 20 countries. Nearly 80% of the students live on campus. The breakdown of the racial diversity among students is White 84%, Hispanic 5%, African American 4%, Asian/Pacific Islander 1%, Native American .5%, and multiracial 1%. In addition, 1% of Benedictine students are international.

Benedictine College is located in Atchison, Kansas, on a 110-acre campus overlooking the Missouri River, about 50 miles north of Kansas City, Missouri. There is a satellite campus in Roeland Park, KS for our graduate business program.
