

What is the GMAT?

The GMAT is the official test of the Graduate Management Admission Council, which administers the exam for business-school applicants. **The Graduate Management Admission Test (GMAT)** is a computer adaptive test intended to assess certain analytical, writing, quantitative, verbal, and reading skills in written English for use in admission to a graduate management program, such as an MBA.

The 4 sections of the GMAT? Analytical Writing Assessment, Integrated Reasoning, Quantitative, and Verbal.

Analytical Writing Assessment (AWA) Section --

The Analytical Writing Assessment (AWA) measures your ability to think critically and to communicate your ideas. During the AWA, you are asked to analyze the reasoning behind a given argument and write a critique of that argument.

Integrated Reasoning Section --

The Integrated Reasoning section measures your ability to evaluate information presented in multiple formats from multiple sources.

Quantitative Section --

The Quantitative section measures your ability to analyze data and draw conclusions using reasoning skills. The mathematics needed to solve the questions in this section of the GMAT exam is not very advanced; reviewing algebra and geometry is a good way to prepare. Problem solving questions measure your ability to solve numerical problems, interpret graphical data, and evaluate information.

Verbal Section --

The GMAT Verbal section measures your ability to read and understand written material, to evaluate arguments, and to correct written material to conform to standard written English.

What difference does CAT make?

CAT = Computer Adaptive Testing. GMAT uses Computer Adaptive Testing which is now used by many standardized exams; it effectively programs the test to increase difficulty after you answer a question right. So acing the first few questions is particularly important. There is also a penalty for unanswered questions, so always fill in an answer.

If you want to apply to business school but don't want to take the GMAT, you may be in luck. More than 1,200 MBA programs now accept the GRE General Test in lieu of the GMAT for admissions, and that means more options for you. Admissions trends are showing that business schools are looking for applicants with more than just a background and experience in business, and that means that the GMAT is not the only test in the game anymore. Before you choose which test to take, you should find out what the schools you are applying to are looking for, and from there the choice is all up to you. What's the difference? The GMAT and the GRE are very different tests, but they have one thing in common. No matter which test you decide to take, you'll need to prepare if you want to get a score that admissions officers can't ignore. Once you pick the test you want to take, your next step should be to choose how you want to prep for that test.
